### Dear Friends

Easter is a time of new life. All around us there are signs of nature waking up after its winter slumber: lambs in the fields; crocuses and daffodils shooting up from the ground; the days are getting longer, and the sun is getting brighter (as the weather gets warmer!). Overall, everything is combining to create a sense of hope. Perhaps you, too, have felt your overall mood improve over the past few weeks...

# Holy Week

# Local Newsround

### LONGTOWN CASTLE

You may have noticed that barriers have been placed and access has been closed to the motte and keep at Longtown Castle. I have received the following from English Heritage:

"English Heritage's contractor recently undertook a high level masonry survey by rope access at Longtown Castle, focusing on the higher keep walls. The contractor subsequently advised that they deem much of the wall head in this area to be loose. They have made safe small pieces of stone and mortar, but significant material is loose and at risk of slipping or falling. To this end, barriers have been installed on the steps to prevent access up to the keep by visitors.

We are now awaiting the formal report from the specialist high level surveyor and hope to agree next steps before the end of March. The report will be used as the basis for the design of a scaffold access to enable a further survey to specify the required repairs. We will keep you updated with regard to the timescales for the next sections of work as they are developed." Longtown Village Pride has an arrangement with English Heritage for the "household maintenance" of the castle. Obviously this does not include any structural work. We understand that contractors will take months rather than a few weeks to complete their work.

This limitation on access will be of particular interest to those who accommodate visitors during this coming summer and to those who use it for educational purposes Bob Burson

# HELP INSECTS THIS MAY

Did you know that insect populations have declined by 75% in the last 50 years? That is a staggering decline and one that has serious implications for all life on our planet. Without insects, our ecosystem is at risk of collapsing. Bees have received lots of publicity for their role in food security but all insects are vital in some way to sustain our wildlife and the overall health of our environment.

There is something very practical you can do to help insects next month: take part in No Mow May.

This is an annual campaign to leave your grass to grow for the month. The emerging flowers are a vital source of nectar for insects and well-fed insects breed well increasing the population, which in turn increases the available food source for birds and so on. As an additional benefit, plants that rarely get to set seed are given valuable time to do so which will increase the range of flowers you see. Constant mowing means that only those plants that spread by suckers or are the Usain Bolts of the flowering world get a look in, which means less variety and fewer insects. Putting your mower to one side for a few weeks can have an extraordinarily positive impact and you can have more time enjoying your garden. If giving up your whole garden to No Mow May seems too big a hurdle, even a small area will help. Find out more at www.plantlife.org.uk

You will see more signs this year on the verges in the Parish group where we are doing No Mow April, May, June and July at the very minimum. We have some wonderful stretches of verge in our community which we will be managing for wildlife. We also have an ambitious surveying plan to find more gems. If you would like to come surveying with the LIFE Biodiversity volunteers, you would be so welcome. No experience is necessary, just the enthusiasm to find out what is out there. We will have you confidently identifying all kinds of treasures in no time at all! Email us at lifeclimatechange@gmail.com for more information.

### HOMES FOR UKRAINE https://ukraine.blackhillcommunities.net

I imagine that you, like me, have been horrified by what is happening in Ukraine and feel that you would like to help in some way with the huge refugee problem. Like me also you may have thought that there is nothing we can do out here because we are too remote and it would not be practical to take refugees. However, where there is a will there is a way!

A group of people, from Newton St Margarets have got together to either open their homes or to offer help in some other way. So far we have six offers from people who will host refugees in their homes and many others who would like to offer practical support. We hope that others in 'our parishes' will feel that they can join this effort.

Anyone can offer to help and if you would like to host and have anything from a spare room to an entire house that you could offer, that would be fantastic! If you would like to help in some other way, and I have in mind offers to drive; to raise funds; to mind the house while hosts take a break; to teach English; to help organise social events for refugees and I am sure there are many other ways that I have not dreamed of, your input would be vital.

The government's intention is that people should sign up (see below) and it will then be the individual's responsibility to find refugees using social media. We feel that this is not very helpful to say the least, and we have other irons in the fire that we hope will result in contact with Ukrainians seeking to come to UK. There may be some of you who have Ukraine contacts of your own and I hope in that case you would share that with us.

It will be the responsibility of local authorities to vet prospective hosts and to vet refugees. That may come to pass. Either way our group is in contact with Hereford Council about this.

It is possible to apply either as an individual or as a group, but confusingly, the two application forms on the government website are the same, so if you wish to host please apply as an individual and we will make sure you are included in the group. The name of the group is 'The Black Hill Community Group'.

So, to be part of this group effort, either as a host or a helper, please contact us via:

#### Transition to Barcoded Stamps

Non-barcoded stamps will be phased out but will remain usable until 31st January 2023. Customers are encouraged to use their non-barcoded stamps before this date. Alternatively, non-barcoded stamps can be exchanged for the new barcoded version through the Royal Mail's 'Swap Out' scheme.

From the 4th April stamp prices will increase:

1st Class stamps will go to 95p from 85p 1st Class Large letter to  $\pounds$ 1.45 from  $\pounds$ 1.29 1st Class small parcel to  $\pounds$ 4.45 from  $\pounds$ 3.85 2nd Class stamps will go up to 68p from 66p 2nd Class large letter to  $\pm 1.05$  from 96p 2nd Class small parcel to  $\pm 3.35$  from  $\pm 3.20$


