

From the Clergy

BRID AND ST BRIGID AND CANDLEMAS

A long time ago early February was the month the Celtic Goddess Brid was celebrated as having awakened with the coming light of spring. A time associated with water as life giving; with poetry, also seen as life giving through its intuitive revelation. A time to celebrate fertility and healing.

With the coming of Celtic Christianity, the life of St Brigid of Kildare became entwined with Brid the Celtic Goddess. Indeed, the Church of England still celebrates Abbess Brigid on the 1st of February. Within Celtic spirituality, Brid and Brigid are seen as keepers of sacred fire and water and are associated with healing. In Kildare there was a pagan temple with a fire that had been kept alight for a thousand years. Instead of trying to extinguish the flames thinking them pagan only, St Brigid, and the women who followed her, kept them aflame for another thousand years. If water was dirty Brigid would turn it to beer in order to heal. One of the prayers associated with her contains these lines:

I would like a great lake of beer for the King of Kings.
I would like to be watching Heaven's family drinking it through all eternity.
I'd like to give a lake of beer to God. I'd love the Heavenly Host to be tippling there
For all eternity.

In Ireland and on the west coast of Scotland red cloth was placed on a windowsill on St Brigid's Day and when it caught the morning dew it would have curative properties for the rest of the year.

Sadly, the celebration of women, fertility and sacred flames were not welcomed by some aspects of the Church. From the 12th century women who had given birth were purified by being 'churched'. Why anyone should be purified after something so natural and beautiful is beyond me. To be fair, the ritual was also used to give thanks for a child and was based on the story of Mary and Joseph bringing Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem to give thanks and to dedicate his life to God. In Britain, this was celebrated as 'Candlemas', also in early February, and there were processions at night with lit candles until the 16th century reformers banned them. Parishioners were having too much merriment!

In the past we have had forms of Christianity that celebrate women and healing and others that think women need purifying and forbids festivities. I know which interpretation I would like to follow. *Revd Simon*

Golden Valley Pilgrim Way - What is it?

The Golden Valley Pilgrim Way is a 6/7 day circular "bring your own beliefs or none" pilgrimage route along the footpaths in this area beginning and ending at Hereford Cathedral.

Pilgrims make a booking via the Deanery office to be able to stay at churches within the deanery each night as they follow the route. In 2024, over 250 pilgrims walked the route staying in churches, and many more are likely to have walked sections of it during the year. A lot of bookings have already been made for 2025.

As well as offering pilgrims a spiritual experience, the project is bringing in income for churches and local businesses and has been shortlisted for the Visit Herefordshire Unsung Hero award with the winner being announced in late February.

LONGTOWN COMMUNITY PRIMARY AND PRE-SCHOOL

The enthusiasm of the Longtown children never ceases to amaze me. The children came back to school on a very cold Tuesday morning, after the excitement of Christmas and being at home for two weeks, with a smile on each and every face and an eagerness to settle back quickly into the routines of listening, asking questions, caring for each other and being the very best they can be!

Class 4 began their climbing sessions at the Longtown Outdoor Learning Trust on the first Friday back. We have strong links with LOLT and are so lucky to have it on our doorstep. The children learn valuable skills as well as enhancing their ability to communicate effectively, work as a team and gain confidence and courage when trying something new.

As well as Class 4, our Year 4 pupils will be treated to two days of confidence building activities at LOLT in February, with activities such as gorge walking, caving, zip wire and canoeing. What a lucky bunch!

We have held our unusual meetings for our Y6 parents to become more familiar with our procedures around SATs, our Y4 parents to share information about the Multiplication Check and our Y1 parents to discuss the phonics screening later in the year.

Class 4 will be visiting Kingstone High School for a school's netball tournament at the end of the month. Good luck team!

Class 2 and Reception will be treated to a visit from Animals Interactive in February, when they will get to meet and handle a collection of animals in school. This will support and enrich their science curriculum looking at both humans and animals.

Our Early Years children continue to explore and learn in the outdoors. Eric the rabbit enjoys being tucked up in his warm hutch, meeting the children and being fed his favourite carrots. After a small hitch, which saw a tree blown onto the top of the classroom in the winds before Christmas, the children are now located back in their space and making all sorts of goodies in their mud kitchen.

The whole school will be visiting Cardiff at the end of February to gain experience of a Hindu Temple and to attend the Dinosaurs Live Show at the Millennium Centre. A day packed with excitement and new experiences for everyone.

Our Patron of Reading, published author Catherine Barr, will be visiting us again in February – something the children and staff are always very excited about. Catherine shares with us the new book she is working on and her travelling adventures. The children are always eager to share their love of reading with Catherine and we love having our own real-life author in school!

Clubs this half term include Photography, Multiskills, Art and Choir and we continue to offer Breakfast Club to all our pupils from 8am each morning. The PTA will also be running two additional Football Card Clubs through the term. Always a winner with the collectors among us. Our popular Stay and Play sessions continue for our very youngest visitors and dates for this half term are Friday February 7th, March7th and 21st and 4th April. We love to welcome new members all the time. Please keep local media scanned for a few special sessions coming up shortly.

Our fantastic PTA will be holding a fabulous Valentine's Disco just before the half term break as part of their never tiring efforts to support our school. They have already paid for our Early Years to have a special light and sensory area in class to support their work on space, and they are paying for the animal visitors in class 2. PTA are also paying for our transport costs to Cardiff, which makes such exciting trips possible. Thank you, PTA.

Our annual Walking Nativity was another resounding success, and a huge crowd of family, friends and interested locals turned up to enjoy our retelling of the Christmas story. We also enjoyed a trip to the panto, with a difference, as we were warmly welcomed to Peterchurch Primary School to watch a touring pantomime - Jack and the Beanstalk. The children had a great time and we are extremely thankful to Peterchurch for inviting us to join them. Pre-school didn't miss out on the festive panto fun either. They 'popped' into the Courtyard in Hereford to watch a lovely retelling of the Elves and the Shoemaker story. Term ended with our delicious Christmas dinner, cooked by our excellent resident chef, Verity Price. It really was a fantastic feast and very much enjoyed by adults and children alike.

In class this term we have a really diverse range of topics. At Michaelchurch, we believe that getting out and about and seeing things first hand is the best way to learn so Acorn Class will be heading off to Caerphilly Castle in February. For all the children in the school, from Pre-School to Year 6, Forest School continues to be a vital part of our week and we are looking forward, as we always do, to seeing the changes that the longer days will bring as we move into springtime. However, as we know only too well, there is plenty of time for winter to strike so I am sure Mr Crocker will still have plenty of opportunities to use his new playground gritting machine!

It was a long night of caroling but thoroughly enjoyed by all.

On Christmas Eve more than a hundred gathered for Carols at the Castle. Far flung places were represented. We had visitors from Norway, Mexico, Australia, Russia and even Ewyas Harold. Longtown Castle entrance was decorated with lights; mulled wine and eating treats were available; musicians led the company in carol singing; Frosty the Snowman arrived with sweets for the children, who then showed off the lanterns they had made. All round it was a marvellous occasion to welcome Christmas Day.

After Christmas our good friends from Malvern, a group of west gallery singers, came to Clodock Church to give a superb concert of old English carols, sung by candlelight from the west gallery. They are pleased to come each year because they so much enjoy singing in our beautiful church. To keep with tradition, yet more mulled wine and mince pies were served.

Then on January 11th it was time for the now traditional Longtown Wassail, made famous last year for being featured on Countyfile by the BBC. A flaming torch parade left the village hall for Longtown Castle where within a circle of small fires, there was a ceremony involving Fair Oak Cider at the apple trees, conducted by Foxwhelp Morris. Later in the village hall there was morris dancing, a mummer's play, folk singing and an auction. Great fun was had by all.

These events raised money for, Schools for Uganda, so the very greatest thanks must go to the many people who welcomed us, donated refreshments, who sang and played, who came along to enjoy the events or welcomed us in, those who donated and those who helped in any of many ways, certainly too many to mention. Donations are still coming in, but today I have sent an initial sum of \pounds 1,250 for urgent work at one of our schools in Uganda. So our very best thanks to all involved. LONGTOWN AND DISTRICT GROUP PARISH COUNCIL

Please note that this report was held over from the December edition

As the previous meeting had to be cancelled because of flooding, so despite a fall of snow the day before, the Council was determined to meet! It was a very full Agenda:

Councillor Cook reported that there had been a speeding survey done by a small sub- committee who drew up a list for Balfour Beatty. This included some attainable goals (road line painting to indicate junctions more clearly, pinch points and speed limits) and more difficult to achieve goals i.e. lowering the speed limit outside the school, amongst others.

The Police attended and their report was very encouraging. The Officer said there had been a low level of crime from July to October. She also said they had been approached to give constructive advice again on the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. This was approved.

The very relevant subject of flooding in the village was raised by Councillor Cook. The severe rainfall in October had created flooding in the village and he had observed at least four manholes which had water pouring from them, one of which had sewage contaminating the ground around, and ultimately ending up in the Olchon brook. It was agreed that the Water Treatment plant was not sufficiently robust to cope with the inundation, and that Welsh Water would be contacted as well as CPRE.

The Draft Budget was discussed and it was agreed not to raise the precept. It has remained at the same level for the last five years.

It was agreed that the Council would continue to support the three Parish Halls – Longtown, Craswall and Walterstone – to the tune of $\pounds 650$ each.

With the bad weather this month there was an enquiry about grit. This is free and available for collection from the west side of Longtown Village Hall.

A small sub committee will be meeting in the New Year to update The Neighbourhood Plan. The Clerk confirmed that a Grant for it has been applied for. This represents the views of the residents of Longtown, Craswall, Llanveynoe and Walterstone. Collected in 2016 and still relevant!
