



GRATITUDE AND THE BIG BANG

Before the theory of the 'Big Bang' became commonplace in explaining the origins of the universe, most cosmologists believed in the steady state theory. In the steady state theory, the earth was said to always exist so there was no beginning, no moment of creation. In contrast the 'Big Bang' is linear, like a good story, it has a beginning and because the universe is expanding it has a narrative and eventually it will have an end. Similarly, the bible has a beginning, a narrative and an end:

Beginning: = The creation account in Genesis
Narrative: = The story of the people of God
End: = Revelation of St John – which is actually a new beginning.

It's important to remind ourselves at this point that the Genesis origin story of Adam and Eve is not to be read literally and is not about how it all began but *why* it all began. Fascinatingly, there are a lot of cosmologists today who are uncomfortable with the 'Big Bang' theory because it seems to reflect the biblical notion of a beginning, an unfolding

The other thing about the 'Big Bang' theory is that it is utterly amazing how utterly, utterly, extraordinary that an explosion leads to such abundant and finely tuned life on earth. The chances that we have an atmosphere; that we have ash and oak trees, snails, hippos, and badgers and food like cucumbers, hazelnuts and lasagne; that we have all this life and that we are conscious of it are infinitesimally minuscule. The 'Big Bang' involved thousands of improbable but precise so-called coincidences in the coming together of 4 particles, electrons, protons, neutrons, and photons with 4 forces, weak and strong nuclear, gravitational and electromagnetic. According to the theoretical physicist Lee Smolin, the chances of existence are 1 in 10 to the power of 229; astronomically low in other words. Infinitely improbable.

On its own, none of this proves the existence of God but for me it is another pointer in that direction. With the chances being so low for life existing, for the harvest being gathered, for such a beautiful planet whatever we think was the cause of the 'Big Bang', these things should induce in us astronomically high levels of gratitude. Everything is made of the same star dust and one way to love this planet back to health is to thank our lucky stars; our providential stars.

The Golden Valley Railway, the Great Western Years.

The GV line was one of many small railway projects planned in the nineteenth century. After years of argument the line was opened from Pontrilas to Dorstone in 1881 with an extension to Hay coming later. From the start the line was plagued with difficulties and by 1898 had to shut. After lengthy negotiations the Great Western agreed to a takeover. Would the GWR deal succeed?

Local author, Bob Steele, will explain what happened.

LONGTOWN GROUP PARISH COUNCIL

A Meeting was held on Wednesday 18th October at 8pm. Council were given an excellent presentation by Bob Burson and Nick Smith on the work of the Longtown Village Projects.

The Parish Council have been supporting this work, and the Councillors enjoyed hearing an update on the maintenance of the Castle, Castle Green, 2 wells and Broome's Garden. They were thanked for their presentation.

The Clerk gave an update of the work to get signs to lower the speed limit around the school to 20 mph. Consultations with Balfour Beatty are moving forward, and siting positions are being discussed.

The Clerk reminded everyone that due to Mr. Toby Murcott's untimely death, another applicant had come forward to stand as our County Councillor. and there would be a new Election.

Now that the evenings are drawing in, it is important to remember Highway Safety. Please consider whether you can be easily seen when you are walking, cycling or running on our pavement-less roads, and think of wearing reflective clothing and carrying torches or wearing headlamps.

The next meeting will be on **November 15th**, and will be at the earlier time of 7.30 pm. As usual, you are warmly invited to attend the meeting, and Open Forum on the Agenda is for anyone who would like to speak. Please note that there will not be a Meeting in December, and the next meeting after that will be **January 17th at 7.30 pm**.

MICHAELCHURCH ESCLEY PRIMARY SCHOOL

It doesn't seem possible that we are now close to the end of the first half term of the 2023/24 academic year. The summer holidays are now very much a distant memory and as the leaves begin to change colour and fall, our thoughts have now been centred around Harvest and Autumn. Every year time seems to rush by more quickly than ever!

It has certainly been an extremely busy start to the autumn term that's for sure. Acorn Class had an absolutely amazing time on their day-trip to Barry Island. The weather was bright and for the most part, the children, staff and parents who were on the trip had a dry day – apart from when they paddled in the sea that is! We are so grateful that we have such capable and adventurous staff who can provide such an exciting experience for the children.

Oak Class, meanwhile, headed towards Birmingham – well, Bournville to be precise – and the wonders of Cadbury World. As well as enjoying the tour of the factory, the 4D cinema experience and stocking up with treats at the factory shop, the children also had a brilliant lesson with one of the Cadbury education team learning about the Mayans and their use of chocolate. They also learnt how the Mayans made their version of hot chocolate with chili and spices – something the children recreated when they got back to school. I can say, having tested it, that the Mayans must have had very different taste buds to us!

School sport is really important to us at Michaelchurch and we try to find as many ways as possible to allow our children to interact with other schools in friendly competitions and

tournaments. Both Oak and Sapling Classes have had the pleasure of competing in friendly matches with Clehonger Primary School this half term. We have been delighted that Clehonger visited us twice now this half term for friendly football and netball matches and just recently we sent a team off to there to play tag rugby.

Coming up we have our harvest service on the 25th October and the Herefordshire Schools Football Tournament on the 26th. Then, in the next half term, we will see swimming lessons start again, led by our two resident swimming instructors/lifeguards Miss Cook and Miss Matthews. These lessons continue throughout the year and allow us to ensure that the children make excellent progress with their swimming. Also coming up at the end of November we have Year 6 Bikeability training in Hereford. We have been taking the children to Hereford for their Bikeability training for 3 years now as we felt that our local environment did not offer sufficient challenge or depth of experience for the children. In addition to all this, Sapling class have an exciting trip to look forward to. They are visiting the Royal Welsh Museum in Brecon for "A Wartime Christmas" workshop, which offers an immersive experience of life during World War II. They are also heading into Hereford to visit Beefy Boys restaurant and Hereford Cathedral!

Of course, the main event in primary schools up and down the country after half-term is Christmas and this year will be as busy as any other. Our Walking Nativity Is really special and there will be carol services, Christmas Decoration day and much more to look forward to.

Finally, we are very proud to announce that our new lunchtime meal provider, Farmhouse Kitchen, aka Verity Price, received a 5 STAR food hygiene rating! The children and staff are loving the meals she is providing, and we are extremely grateful for her diligence and attention to detail which resulted in such a positive inspection outcome.




